In late August we had our fifth annual live broadcast of the American Folk Festival on the Bangor Waterfront, this year from the Railroad Stage. Thanks to the American Folk Festival organizers and volunteers, the National Council for the Traditional Arts and, of course, WERU members and volunteers for supporting the broadcast. August ended with two

memorial events for dearly-departed WERU volunteers. A

beautiful graveside service for Royce Dixon took place on August 31st at the Maine Veterans' Memorial Cemetery in Augusta, preceded and followed by a number of heartfelt radio dedications. The Most Innovative Art Form of the Last Thirty Years.

It is not often remembered that in it's early days Hip Hop was not embraced by the "black establishment." Even though homeproduced tapes had circulated in the ghetto for years, black record labels didn't take those raw street slang ephemera seriously. They didn't think there would be a market for such an unfinished sounding product.

It wasn't until Sylvia Robinson of Sugar Hill Records finally relented to the pleas of her employees and released "Rapper's Delight" in 1979 that the general public was exposed to this new art form. Set to the rhythm of Chic's "Good Times" and featuring rambling lyrics borrowed from Grandmaster Caz, the record was a surprise hit, but initially thought of as a novelty record. Nonetheless, copycats followed, most initially taking off on the "Good Times" rhythm, and gradually a fan base was grown outside of New York City. But by 1985, there was still little radio exposure for the music; indeed, some people even refused to call it music.

In Boston, MIT's radio station had a nightly show of black music called "The Ghetto" that was playing such things as The Gap Band, Prince, Morris Day & The Time, etc. That summer I was filling in about once a week. I would play exclusively rap, and the phone lines would ring off the hook. "Keep it going!" listeners would shout. No-one else was playing those records. By September I decided to start a new show devoted exclusively to records made with electronic beats.


Boston's only black-owned radio station, WILD, was so anti-rap that when one of the ghetto record stores that underwrote my show produced a radio spot using a rap background, it aired only once before Joe Johnson, the owner, called up and forbid that spot to ever be played again. At the time, Stevie Wonder said of rap, "It's like there was a third world war, and music had to start all over again from scratch." I remember thinking, "That's meant as a dis, but actually it's a compliment." Rap was that original, that revolutionary. Of course, there were precursors.

"The Last Poets" record on Douglas Records in 1969 was one. A sort of black beat poetry record complete with a conga drum backbeat, The Last Poets' first record was a revelation of defiance and verbal virtuosity. Jamaican "toasters" had been talking over dub versions of reggae hits for years and in fact I had many "toasters" live on my reggae show at WMBR. But, the reggae raps were more adjuncts to the rhythms than new forms, though some of the new creators of the new rap, like Grandmaster Flash and Kool Herc, had Island backgrounds.

Another influence had DJs combining this new rapping with rhythms influenced by the German electronic group Kraftwerk. Electronic bleeps became the beats, and any kid with a cheap drum machine had the capability to produce a do-it-yourself basement tape at home. There was no need to hire studio time or studio musicians. Rap was essentially a "street" art form. Those rappers who had no access to a drum machine improvised by making percussive noises with their mouths, creating "Human Beat Boxes." It wasn't the first time entertainers had used their mouths for sound effects, but it was the first time they had used the percussive possibilities for the downbeat.

In the early days, hip-hop DJs were limited by no vinyl to play and instead learned to use 2 turntables to segue back and forth between instrumental segments on different records for the beats to back up the rappers. This led to using the turntables as musical instruments, as in "scratching", and to using snippets of voices, sounds, or music as "samples." Soon DJs began to program these samples into their drum machines in order to "play" them with a tap on the keyboard.

In 1913, the Italian futurist artist Luigi Russolo predicted that the music of the future would be comprised not of traditional melodies or harmonies, but of carefully combined "unmusical sounds". He speculated that the sounds of the city, the screeching of streetcars, the horns of auto-

mobiles, the staccato of jackhammers would be a brave new music that he called "The Art of Noise." The spoken word itself is more percussive than the sung word, and the combinations of electronic beats, scratching of turntables, sporadic samples, street

slang and even human beat-



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

VillageSoup and Waldo County Citizen Sales Manager. Individual members participate by posting personal announcements such as engagements and births, opinions and quick comments and continuously contribute stories and blogs. VillageSoup is also associated with the Knox County Times and the Waldo County Citizen. While the two papers are less than five years old, they cumulatively circulate over 12,000 copies. VillageSoup.com receives nearly 8,000 individual hits a day and over 3.5 million hits a month.

VillageSoup began in 1996 when Anderson, who previously designed elementary and high school curriculum for national publishers Houghton Mifflin, Macmillan/ Mc-Graw Hill and Prentice Hall, moved to Camden intending to utilize the Internet in order to give small businesses the chance to compete on a larger

scale by including all members of the community. In increase traffic to the website, VillageSoup began posting daily news written and posted by professionals in areas that had previously only received weekly news. Traffic to the site was also generated by business ads, posts, and the opportunity it gave members of the community to communicate with one another.

In May 2007, Knox and Waldo VillageSoup was awarded a \$885,000 grant from the John S. and James L. Knight News Challenge. The John S. and James L. Knight Foundation gives grants to over 26 towns across the nation that are committed to providing quality journalism and news coverage. VillageSoup was among 25 other "News Challenge" recipients, including MTV and MIT. The 25 organizations were selected on the basis of their "digital and innovative approach (?) to timely and

community-building journalism." VillageSoup was selected specifically to redeploy its software, making the site more efficient while including more services. "We want to see more sites with the VillageSoup brand across the country" says Anderson. While national recognition is

certainly a testament to the site's success, the outpouring support from the community seems to speak louder. In anageofmega-media, alocal news website has united a community and given citizens the opportunity to act locally.

www.WERU.org is also undergoing changes. The station is striving to provide a more accessible and informative website for listeners and supporters. 


Mark Knopfler --- Kill to get Crimson


Knopfler's newest release has already reached number two on the European Billboard charts. This disc is produced by keyboardist and former Notting Hillbillies bandmate, Guy Fletcher. The music is a blend of deep resonance of traditional folk and the edgier sound of Dire Straits. Stylus magazine says Knopfler "...is at once egoless and supremely accomplished, a testament to the rare talent that enables a master to say something simply and beautifully, and leave it exactly at that". This disc offers 57 minutes of mellow Americana or country, rock and blues blend to evoke past favorites. .

Mary Gauthier --- Between Daylight To Dark

Louisiana born artist Mary Gauthier's latest effort has the Associated Press saying, "...she is among the best singer-songwriters of her generation, especially when it comes to illustrating ramblers, derelicts and anyone who struggles with demons in the night". Because of her simultaneously strong and gritty, yet aching and vulnerable voice, she has often been compared to Lucinda Williams. Her songwriting, often compared to John Prine's, is sparse and uncluttered with melodies that sound like they've been around for a long time. Produced by Joe Henry, these ten cuts are well worth the listen.








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Spoon — Ga Ga Ga Ga Ga

Spoon's sixth full length release gives us Britt Daniels' songwriting at it's best. There is an ease about these songs that shows Daniels' writing has matured to the point of creating a fuller sound by adding just the right amount of a musical blend. Drummer Jim Eno produced this disc and adds texture without overwhelming the minimal songs. Refusing to go the obvious route, this Austin based band has fashioned a fresh yet familiar sound on their most groove

oriented disc since their 2001 release, Girls Can Tell.

Iron and Wine --- The Shepherd's Dog

Carolina born, Austin native Sam Beam is Iron and Wine. Beam has stepped away from his low-fi one-guy-with-a-bedroom-studio beginnings and has surrounded himself with a large cast of musicians and instruments (vibraphones, accordions, etc.) to give us a lush disc full of imagination and rich arrangements. This is Iron and Wine's best, most diverse and listenable disc, balanced in layers of evolving percussive figures around Beam's melodies. These 12 cuts with a touch of world music and wide range of styles has Paste magazine calling Beam, "...one of America's most vital folk singers". .





Rilo Kiley – Under The Blacklights

Under The Blacklight is the return to the studio of Rilo Kiley since cofounders Jenny Lewis and Blake Sennett complet their own side projects. Sennett has played with the Elected, an elegant and underrated Indie collective. Lewis received rave reviews with the release of Rabbit Fur Coat, her project with the Watson Twins. The versatility and punch of the rhythm section is a marked feature on their new record. The 11 songs on this disc are complex music made simple and are sure to be a launching pad for Lewis and Rilo Kiley's ascent to true stardom.
