

in to a new program, Conceptual Continuity with Howie Kittelson featuring all things Frank Zappa, Saturday midnight to Sunday 2 a.m.







Feist --- Metals

Leslie Feist's indie roots come from her time with the Canadian band Broken Social Scene. With the release of her second solo album, Let It Die in 2004, Feist has enjoyed commercial success and collected several Juno awards and Grammy nominations. After taking some time off from her busy schedule, in January of 2011 she and collaborators Chilly Gonzales and Mocky went to Big Sur to record Metals. Telegraph.com/uk says the album is "rich in atmospheric beauty, Feist's quivering voice oozes sensuality and acts as a focal point for the drowsy piano, rumbling blues workout and ethereal soul." 


The Infamous Stringdusters --- We'll Do It Live





Putting Babies Back on the Map

Cathy Jacobs hosts Baby Talk, held on the 4th Wednesday of the month, from 10 to 11 am.

Cathy says: "Baby Talk began in October, 2001 as a half hour program and in October, 2002 was expanded to one hour. I have been the host for the entire ten years and I continue to learn new things from every guest, whether face to face in the studio or by phone from away.

Topics have ranged from the practical (e.g., elimination communication, breastfeeding, cloth diapers) to the poignant (e.g., infant loss, babies affected by substance use, autism) to the thought provoking (e.g., early brain development, teaching babies to read, multiracial households) and beyond. In the future I hope, among other things, to explore new research about infancy, especially concerning the effects of the early months and years on our later emotional and physical health. Ideas for topics and guests are always welcome."

"The goal of Baby Talk is to help put babies and the importance of the prenatal/infant period "on the map." Research shows that what happens during our gestation and infant period is critical to whom we become but this fact is often ignored. I welcome your feedback.'

In addition to hosting Baby Talk Jacobs is the program manager of Hancock County's Maine Families program which, as she puts it, "has a similar goal, to ensure that expectant and parenting families are nurtured and supported during this critical period in infants' lives.'

proach to Healthy Options." She said, "Let's face it, if I can undersand the topics we cover, so can the rest of our listening audience." Andree started out interviewing local practitioners and soon expanded her reach with phone interviews from afar. She says she has had the privilege of interviewing a medical anthropologist from Hawaii, a shaman from Peru and a former prosecutor from the Cooks County Sherrif's Department of Chicago

and has covered such diverse and controversial topics: as vaccinations, medical marijuana, autism, and the legalization of street drugs.

Rhonda Feiman, a licensed acupuncturist and Chinese herbalist, has been involved with radio as a sound engineer, producer and host for over 25 years. She said, "I am thrilled to be able to explore health related topics in depth on Healthy Options. For the past few years many of my programs have focused on treatment of trauma. We have explored the ways trauma manifests in the body and have looked at ways to heal and recover. This has involved speaking with practitioners working with veterans, survivors of domestic abuse, earthquake victims and more, as well as discussing how smaller events in our lives can also cause disruption in the body. This is only possible in a setting such as WERU, where we are encouraged

to explore topics not fully covered elsewhere. I have looked at issues as diverse as death and dying, and how our relationship to money effects our health. The opportunity to create diverse and eclectic programming which hopefully can help aid our listeners in their own healing processes is what keeps me coming back." Healthy Options hosts have great respect for the WERU listeners and welcome feedback and ideas for future shows.



WERU's New Autumn Featured Artists

WERU is (as of this writing) currently receiving the most music of the calendar year as independent promoters, musicians, and record companies send their compact discs to our radio station. They are all hoping that our airplay can help drive holiday sales of their material. Even with all of the new avenues to screen music (through mobile devices, placement in movies and television shows, social networks, and other websites) radio is still the place most people hear new music and decide whether to purchase it or not. Our on-air volunteers are experts in their genres of choice and for the most part add their picks for the best new music to their programs. When many other radio stations turn to holiday programming this month you have a local choice to hear the best of the new music while also getting the entire recorded history of it in various formats. With the flood of new releases arriving at WERU we need a Music Department of volunteers to manage it all -- thanks to Pat, Chris, and Lonya for processing all of it!

Various artists have contributed to the new album The Lost Notebooks Of Hank Williams and this is currently # 1 on WERU's Americana airplay chart. Hank Williams has been an inspiration for countless country and rock musicians and this was proven when he was inducted into the Country Music Hall of Fame as well as the Rock & Roll Hall of Fame. The list of musicians paying homage to Hank by performing songs from writings left behind in those "lost notebooks" (four bound journals he carried around



in his briefcase) is a long one. Fellow inspiration to countless others Bob Dylan was the first musician approached for this project and his cooperation allowed Alan Jackson, Lucinda Williams, Norah Jones, and Jack White to finish (or record for the first time) Hank Williams' compositions. Our disc jockeys have loved to spin these unheard lyrics to you onair.

Another album getting similar attention this fall is the latest (their thirteenth) by Chicago-based act Wilco. This alternative rock group has been around for seventeen years since alternative country group Uncle Tupelo disbanded in




the wake of Jay Farrar's leaving the band. Though many musicians have become members of (and left) Wilco since its creation singer Jeff Tweedy and bassist John Stirratt still remain in the current line-up. Wilco has always had one foot in the alternative country world and one in the alternative rock world as their music is descended from both pop and punk with an Americana flavor. The new album, The Whole Love, was released (after a twenty-four hour stream on their own website) in late September and has been receiving much attention at WERU since then. Wilco once performed at the Camden Opera House.

Three other albums receiving heavy airplay on WERU this fall show the diversity of our programmers and our listeners. Blues artist (with some folk and country leanings) Malcolm Holcombe recently performed at a WERU benefit concert in Bangor and the accompanying on-air attention shot his latest album To Drink The Rain to the top of WERU's AAA (adult album alternative) charts. Canadian songwriter



Feist (born Leslie Feist but using only her surname for her career) released Metals in early October and has also been getting much airplay. The album was recorded this past February in a wooden room somewhere in California during approximately seventeen days of rainstorms. Composer / singer Ry Cooder (ranked # 8 on Rolling Stone's "The 100 Greatest Guitarists Of All Time" chart) just released his new album Pull Up Some Dust And Sit Down. You can hear that album all




WERU continues to play songs from it for you!

WERU programs that feature electronica music have been playing Neon Indian's Era Extrana album (available on Mom & Pop). Our world music disc jockeys have actually been playing a Balkan and Eastern European act from Lewiston named Cinder Conk (from the record Kukeri). This duo has performed with another WERU world music program mainstay (Fishtank Ensemble) and has played all over the Northeastern region of the United States. Another musician with Maine roots is in the band Jackson Garrett. Christopher Gore (from Biddeford) is the composer of the group's music and their new album Let Sleeping Dogs Lie currently sits at the top of WERU's jazz charts.

One of my most frequent Christmas gifts was music whether it was in the form of an eight-track (Kiss' Double Platinum), vinyl (Michael Jackson's Thriller), cassette (Daryl Hall & John Oates' Big Bam Boom), or compact disc (George Michael's Faith). For many years record stores sold most of their product during the weeks of this holiday shopping season. Record companies released special collections (greatest hits collections, tribute albums, or live recordings) and the most anticipated releases by superstars at this time of year in the hopes that shoppers would acquire these as gifts (or for themselves) as Christmas drew ever closer. Much has been written about the last decade's decline of the record industry. Since the dawn of Napster and illegal downloading / sharing of music, followed by the convenience and market dominance of iTunes, the record companies have seen album sales decrease. However, as a fellow lover of music I urge you to

get your gift ideas (for yourself or others) by tuning in to WERU over the next few weeks and hear the best new music available for purchase in multiple genres courtesy of our volunteer programmers! Happy Holidays!







Common Health 10/19/11: "Paying For Health Care"



The cost of health care insurance leapt more than 10% this year, even while our economy, wages and commodity prices have stagnated or declined. In rural parts of Maine small businesses and self-employed workers are seeing insurance rate increases up to 90%.
